Cedar Hall School Exclusion Policy

Background

These arrangements inform the school's use of exclusion. It is underpinned by the shared commitment of all members of the school community to achieve two important aims:

- To ensure the safety and wellbeing of all members of the school community and to maintain an appropriate education environment in which all can learn and succeed.
- 2. To realise the aim of reducing the need to use exclusion as a sanction.

Introduction

The decision to exclude a pupil will be taken in the following circumstances;

- 1. In response to a serious breach of the school's Behaviour Policy
- 2. If allowing the pupil to remain in school would seriously harm the education or welfare of other persons or the pupil him/herself in the school.

Exclusion is an extreme sanction and is only administered by the Head Teacher. Exclusion, whether for a fixed term or permanent may be used for any of the following, all of which constitute examples of unacceptable conduct and are infringements of the school's behaviour policy:-

- Verbal abuse to staff and others
- Verbal abuse to pupils
- Physical abuse/attack on staff
- Physical abuse/attack on pupils
- Indecent behaviour
- Damage to property
- Misuse of illegal drugs
- Misuse of other substances
- Theft
- Serious actual or threatened violence against another pupil or a member of staff
- Sexual abuse or assault
- Supplying an illegal drug
- Carrying an offensive weapon
- Arson
- Unacceptable behaviour which has previously been reported and for which school sanctions and other interventions have not been successful in modifying the pupil's behaviour.

This is not an exhaustive list and there may be other situations where the Head Teacher makes the judgement that exclusion is an appropriate sanction. At times the Head Teacher will decide not to use the extreme sanction of exclusion but will decide that a Pastoral Support Plan should be drawn up to try and avoid the sanction of an exclusion in the future. This might be accompanied by an internal exclusion.

Exclusion Procedure

Most exclusions are of a fixed term nature and are of a short duration (usually between 1 and 3 days). The DfE regulations allow the Head Teacher to exclude a pupil for one or more fixed periods not exceeding 45 school days in any one school year. The Governors have established arrangements to promptly review all permanent exclusions and all fixed term exclusions that would lead to a pupil being excluded for more than 15 days in a school term or missing a public examination. The Governors have established arrangements to review fixed term exclusions which would lead to a pupil being excluded for more than five days but not more than 15 days in a school term where a parents has expressed a wish to make representations. Following exclusion parents are contacted immediately where possible. A letter will be sent by post giving details of the exclusion and the date the exclusions ends. Parents have a right to make representations to the Governing Body and the Local Authority as directed in the letter.

A return to school meeting will be held following the expiry of the fixed term exclusion and this will involve a member of the Senior Management Team and other staff where appropriate. During this meeting a Pastoral Support Plan will be drawn up, which will include a review date. During the course of a fixed term exclusion where the pupil is to be at home, parents are advised that the pupil is not allowed on the school premises, and that day time supervision is their responsibility as parents/guardians. Records relating to exclusions will be stored confidentially.

Permanent Exclusions

The decision to exclude a pupil permanently is a serious one. There are two main types of situation in which permanent exclusion may be considered:

The first is a final, formal step in a concerted process for dealing with disciplinary offences following the use of a wide range of other strategies, which have been used without success. It is an acknowledgement that all available strategies have been exhausted and is used as a last resort. This would include persistent and defiant misbehaviour including bullying (which would include racist or homophobic bullying) or repeated possession and/or use of an illegal drug on school premises.

The second is where there are exceptional circumstances and it is not appropriate to implement other strategies and where it would be appropriate to permanently exclude a pupil for a first or 'one-off' offence. These might include:-

- Serious actual or threatened violence against another pupil or member of staff
- Sexual abuse or assault
- Supplying an illegal drug
- Carrying an offensive weapon (offensive weapons are defined in the Prevention of Crime Act 1993 as 'any article made or adapted for causing injury to the person; or intended by the person having it with him for such use by him'.
- Arson
- Behaviour which poses a significant risk to the child's own safety.

The school will involve the police for any relevant offences. These instances are not exhaustive but indicate the severity of such offences and the fact that such behaviour seriously affects the discipline and well-being of the school.

General factors the school considers before asking a decision to exclude.

Exclusion will not be imposed instantly unless there is an immediate threat to the safety of others in the school or the pupil concerned. Before deciding whether to exclude a pupil, either permanently or for a fixed period, the Head Teacher will:-

- Ensure appropriate investigations have been carried out
- Consider all evidence available to support the allegations taking into account the Behaviour Policy
- Allow the pupil to give his/her version of events
- Explore the wider context, taking into consideration how much the incident may have been provoked (for example by bullying or by racial or sexual harassment).

If the Head Teacher is satisfied that on the balance of probabilities the pupil did what he/she is alleged to have done, then exclusion will be the outcome.

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
